Many, many notes of encouragement and appreciation were written and received. Many visits were made to those who were sick or home-bound. Many comforting words were said.

We worked together to respond to the needs of the world. This year we revamped the way we organize ourselves for Family Promise. Bruce McCrae worked long and hard to set up a new system for finding and coordinating the many volunteers that are needed to fill all the slots for each of the four weeks during which we – with the help of Lakewood Christian Church and others – host and care for homeless families. men coming out of prison – 56 this year! We also provided support for The Second Chance Center through personal involvement and financial gifts. As a congregation and as individuals we remain involved in many good causes.

We grew as a congregation. This year we received eight persons into membership and welcomed others who have come to regularly be part of our worship and activities. We raised money through a successful yard sale and financial pledges to replace the roof. Our kitchen was renovated. We grew copious amounts of produce in the church garden, some of which was shared with The Action Center food pantry.

We remained connected with the larger church by participating in Mennonite World Conference, Mennonite Church USA Convention and Mountain States Mennonite Conference Annual Assembly. It was a difficult year for our denomination with sharp disagreement over whether gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender folks can be fully included or not. Here at GHMC we are not all in agreement but it has not torn us apart. Thanks be to God!

We looked to the future. In September Jeff Bontrager, our congregational chairperson, challenged us to think about where our passions lie. What is it that gives us energy and hope as we live out our commitment to follow Jesus? That conversation will continue....

As this year draws to a close and a new one begins we give thanks for all the ways we have been and will continue being a church together. We prepare to participate in our annual Hanging of the Greens extravaganza with happy, hopeful hearts, knowing that the future is in God's hands and that, no matter what, it will be good.

#### Freedom Bound Advent 2015

This year the Advent season will be for us a time of reflection on how God's coming in Jesus releases us from personal, social and historical chains that bind us. Our theme is "Freedom bound." We live in the paradox that we are both bound and free, on a march to freedom but encumbered by the burden and sin we carry; we are carrying the scars of struggle but living with a new hope. God's freedom takes us down pathways of justice, mercy, trust, love, service and inclusion. "Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths" (Psalm 25:4). In Advent we are walking, moving, travelling toward greater freedom even as we unloosen ourselves from the chains that bind us.

During the Sundays of Advent our worship services will include some special elements: The altar table display will remind us of the chains that bind us and, as the season progresses, how those chains are taken away. Each Sunday we will read a litany as the Advent candle is lit and one of the chains is removed. Each week we will pray these words: "Liberating God, set us free. As we walk this road of freedom, give us more love, more hope, more peace and more joy." We will sing our Advent theme song, "There is more love somewhere," STJ #109.

Advent 2, December 6: "Freedom bound: The Path of Mercy"

*Texts:* Malachi 3:1-4; Luke 1:68-79; Luke 3:1-6; Philippians 1:3-11

*Focus statement:* In this second week of Advent, images of God's mercy wash over us. The most striking image is of light that enters the darkness – dawning on us, illuminating our darkness, and giving us the strength to make the changes we need to be on this freedom way.

Advent 3, December 13: "Freedom bound: The Path of Trust"

Texts: Isaiah 12:1-6; Zephaniah 3:14-20; Luke 3:7-18; Philippians 4:4-7

*Focus statement:* Fear of the unknown, fear of the past, and fear for our security entangles and paralyzes us. On this third Sunday of Advent we bring our fears to God. We long to be released from their power over our lives. Instead of life-denying servitude or a joyless acceptance of fate, our passages counsel God's people to an impassioned, joyful and trusting response to life.

Advent 4, December 20: "Freedom bound: The Path of Love"

Texts: Psalm 80:1-7; Micah 5:2-5a; Luke 1:39-56; Hebrews 10:5-10

*Focus statement:* From the smallest tribe in Israel, from a poor teenager, from the margins God is bringing real and unexpected freedom. The fourth Sunday of Advent explains what God's labor of love will mean for the world. The upheaval that Mary sings about is nothing short of revolutionary.

### Psalm for November 13, 2015

This is an abecedarian poem; each line starts with a letter of the alphabet. It incorporates titles of the songs from Godspell.

After Godspell I went home singing Bless the Lord oh my soul checked the computer, discovered terrorist attacks in Paris everywhere people crying out—I feared the apocalypse.

God of goodness, how can such hatred exist, children bearing bombs embedded in their bodies, hoping to blast themselves to heaven? Justice is complicated today, kindness a luxury. Yet, the psalmist reminds:

Learn your lessons well, trust the Merciful one, who does Not count the sins of our youth against us. Open our hearts to compassion, Prepare the way of the Lord Quiet our anguish Restore our trust in you.

Save the people: turn us from urge to understanding, move us beyond vengeance to wisdom. *We beseech Thee* x-tinguish our fear with Your peace. Let us share it zealously
